TONY BROWNE

Tony Browne is Executive Chair of the New Zealand Contemporary China Research Centre and Chair of the Victoria University of Wellington Confucius Institute. Tony has filled senior roles in the management of New Zealand's relations with China from 1994 to 2011 and was New Zealand Ambassador to China from 2004 to 2009.

Geremie Barmé is an Australian sinologist, author, and film-maker on modern and traditional China. He is Director of the Australian Centre on China in the World and Chair Professor of Chinese History at Australian National University College of Asia, and the Pacific in Canberra, and co-founder of the Wairarapa Academy for New Sinology 白水書院 (www.chinaheritage.net).

Jason Young is the Director of the New Zealand Contemporary China Research Centre and an Associate Professor in the School of History, Philosophy, Political Science and International Relations at Victoria University of Wellington. His research focuses on Chinese politico-economic and institutional reform, Chinese foreign policy and New Zealand-China relations.



Peter Harris is a Senior Fellow of the New Zealand Contemporary China Research Centre and former founding Executive Director of the Asia New Zealand Foundation. He studied classical Chinese in Oxford before being thrown in the deep end by having to write and broadcast on China for the BBC World Service. He lived in China for seven years, working for a time with the New Yorkbased Ford Foundation, with its unrivalled range of programs and contacts.

MASTERCLASS FACILITATORS



Peter Kennedy is a former Executive Director of the NZ Institute of International Affairs. From 2007 to 2011 he served as New Zealand Ambassador to the EU (and NATO). Earlier he was Ambassador to Korea and International Affairs Adviser to the Prime Minister during the Gulf War and New Zealand's previous term on the UN Security Council. His extensive trade negotiating experience includes the WTO, APEC, the OECD and CER.



Paul Clark is a pioneer in the academic study of Chinese films. After completing a masters degree in NZ Māori history, he was one of the first three New Zealand students to go to Beijing on official exchange for two years study. Paul's Harvard PhD thesis was on the Chinese film industry from 1949 to 1983. He has published books on Māori history, Chinese cinema, a cultural history of the Cultural Revolution, and on Chinese youth culture in 1968, 1988 and 2008.



John McKinnon served as New Zealand's Ambassador to China and Mongolia from January 2015 to April 2018. Prior to taking up the role of Ambassador, John was Executive Director of the Asia New Zealand Foundation from 2012-2014, and New Zealand's Secretary of Defence from 2006-2012. John was previously Deputy Secretary in MFAT, responsible for New Zealand's relations with Asia and the Americas.



Brian Moloughney is Professor of Chinese History at the University of Otago. After completing his MA, Brian spent two years studying at Nanjing University under the auspices of the New Zealand-China Exchange Scholarship. Following that Brian completed a PhD in Chinese History at the Australian National University. He is a regular visitor to China and a visiting fellow at Peking University and Wuhan University.
